Hey, GO SLOW ...

Please slow down and drive carefully on Sparrow Point Way (Falcon Ridge).

Be kind, look out for the safety of our neighbors, children, pets, and wildlife.



WE HATE TO NAG BUT ... DOG WASTE!

Most neighbors do, but a few don't and it's mighty unpleasant: please pick up after your dog.

Dog waste on our open space trails isn't just unpleasant – it's a problem for the local ecosystem.

The waste is different from wildlife waste because it contains concentrated nutrients from processed dog food, along with harmful bacteria and parasites.

Leaving it behind can lead to:

- Unbalanced soil conditions and invasive plant growth.
- Water pollution and algae blooms.
- Illness for both wildlife and humans.

So, please grab a bag from a dispenser at the trailhead, pick up after your dog, and dispose of it in the bins provided.

Let's keep our open spaces clean and healthy for everyone.

Court Rules in Favor of Willow Springs Open Space

The 'Norton vs. Willow Springs Open Space Lawsuit' was filed in Jefferson County District Court, with Norton seeking to claim a portion of our open space through Adverse Possession. The trial occurred in April.

In good news, the court ruled in favor of Willow Springs Open Space. The court affirmed that the Nortons can continue their historical use of the land as long as they own it. However, the land remains a protected part of the open space, and any structures or improvements on it must be removed if the property is ever sold.

The Board will conduct boundary surveys at appropriate intervals to prevent encroachments into the open space.
